1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Our institution has a well planned curriculum delivery and documentation system. At the beginning of each session a meeting is conducted and the details of the courses and criterion of admission are finalized. After the completion of the admission procedure and before the commencement of the classes an orientation program is conducted for the students by the teachers in which the students are introduced to their respective disciplines. Our methods of teaching include Chalk and Blackboard method, Lectures, ICT based teachinglearning and projects are conducted according to subject requirement. The institution according to laid guidelines of the affiliated university conducts internal assessment of the students on a semester basis. After the publication of results a Parent-Teacher meeting is organized to discuss about the progress of the students. All the departments guide their students to publish wall magazines and conduct student seminars where the students present papers on topics related to their disciplines. All the departments of the college conduct Extension lectures where the departments invite external speakers from different colleges and universities to enlighten our students . The different departments take their students to educational excursions once a year which are highly informative and enriching for the students. The college also arranges for remedial and tutorial for its students who are comparatively weaker and have difficulty to cope with the curriculum.

For continuous internal evaluation we conduct regular internal assessment per semester. We also conduct regular class tests pertaining to the syllabus of each department, semester wise. We also conduct tutorial classes outside the main routine and also conduct remedial classes for the slow learners. The students are encouraged to do reference work from our well maintained library. We also guide the students to prepare their answers. We conduct extension lectures for enriching the students by inviting professors and teachers from other Universities and Colleges.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Commencement of Classes for Semester I started from the 2nd week of July 2018. The internal assessment was held within the last week of September, 2018 for Semester I . The Examination for Semester I took place in the month of December, 2018. The commencement of classes for Semester II was from the month of February 2019. Internal assessment for semester II was held in the month of April, 2019 and the University Examination for this semester was held in the month of June, 2019. The publication the result for semester I was on the 1st week of February, 2019 and the Publication of result for Semester II was on the 1st week of September, 2019. Commencement of Classes in the old syllabus(without semester) was held in the 2nd week of July, 2018. Midterm for Part II was held on the 1st week of November, 2018 and the test examination for the part II students was held in the 2nd week of February, 2019 and the college test for part III students was held in the 3rd week of January, 2019. Test results came out in the 2nd week of March for part II students and 3rd week of February for part III students. The University Examination for part III students was held in the month of March and for part II students it was held in the month of April, 2019. The results for part II examination (University Examination) was published in the month of August, 2019 and the University examination results for part III students was published in the month of June, 2019.
